


















Immersion Day Workshop with Jacqui Stockdale

Here and There, Everywhere 2023 digital print, string, board

Artist Statement

Spiralling and uncontrollable thoughts surround me in my personal space. Are they in yours? Luring your eyes and mind into a perspective of catastrophic thinking, the centre exposes these spiralling, trapped and confined feelings we all might feel within the sanctuaries of our personal space. It pulls you through a journey of different directions, from the 'heres' and 'theres' and 'everywheres' of built-up emotions and aggravations of a teenage girl.

Reborn 2023 ceramics, gold leaf

Artist Statement

Reborn underwent a creation, destruction and renewal phase. The final vase had been dropped and smashed, inspired by Ai Weiwei's artwork Dropping a Han Dynasty Urn 1995, and the controversy surrounding his destruction of the work. Viewers are compelled to confront their biases towards beauty, and destroying these exquisite pieces highlights the impermanence of superficial attraction, urging a deeper appreciation of an object's essence.

Down in the Pond 2023 oil on canvas

Artist Statement

These paintings portray how reflections capture memories. This pair of paintings combine parts of two mundane memories of a reflection. From my bathtub to a pond I encountered at a park, these memories have been merging into a single, more dreamlike scene. The juxtaposition between the indoor and outdoor environments feeds into the more imaginative part of my mind, creating a slight sense of surrealism and prompts its audience to contemplate where the line between indoor and outdoor environments cross over.

'312/12' 2023 mixed media on metal wire

Artist Statement

1 every 28 hours, 6 every week, 312 every year. In 2022, 312 18-to-24-year-old Australian males chose to take their own lives. The epidemic surrounding men's mental health is undeniable. '312/12' confronts outdated gender constructs of manhood, highlighting the spectrum of emotions associated with men's mental health and, in particular, suicide. Comprised of manuscripts, 'MAN UP!' portrays the negative experience males face at the hands of outdated gender norms and archaic perceptions of masculinity.



Annabelle Stone

The Essence of Moss 2023 oil on canvas

Artist Statement

Moss, the Japanese symbol of peace, shows how nature changes the atmosphere of an area, turning stress to peace. The friendly moss creature in the artwork's foreground creates tranquillity for the girl, juxtaposing the dark city background. The personification of moss was inspired by Shintoism, an ancient Japanese religion. Audiences are engulfed in the peaceful feeling he brings and connect to him through the personification, highlighting how people's connection to nature is vital to prevent being overtaken with life's stress.

Always Human 2023 digital media

Artist Statement

Experiences form the human journey of life. Memories create the human experience by helping us understand who we truly are. Always Human follows a humanoid figure looking back on their memories, demonstrating that they are still human even in this robotic, dystopian world. Monochromatic colours illustrate the dominance of Artificial Intelligence. The memories correspond with my personal colour association: yellow – joy/happiness; blue – grief/sadness; orange – energy and optimism; purple – ambition; and pink – naivety and childhood innocence.

Artist Statement

Leda's Spirit explores the relationship of people to their spirit animals. My own spirit animal is the swan and I have always felt a connection to this beautifully elegant creature. I have paid homage to the Greek myth of 'Leda and the Swan' by choosing to work in traditional oil paint and present it in a heavily ornate frame. The anonymity of the figure is intended to create a greater sense of engagement with the audience.

Artist Statement

Artist Statement

Artist Statement

The embroidery symbolises the time and willpower needed to fix humanity's mistakes and the damage already made; the destruction of the world my generation will inherit. 


Isobelle Woehrle




Karen Lanuza


Katia Campaniello




Lucinda Richards




Mene Nei




Mia Wallace

Artist Statement

Artist Statement

My close friend has been hospitalised for months due to anorexia. This work is a homage to her heroic resilience. I used a tattoo gun, an unconventional tool, to symbolise the physical and emotional scars my friend has endured throughout her battle. My hope is that this artwork serves as a reminder to my friend - and to others facing similar struggles - that they possess an unwavering strength within themselves. Despite great adversity, we can find the power to persevere.



Nikola Cathie

A Hundred Years in the Making and From Now Until Forever 2023 textiles

Artist Statement

Reflecting on the past and present, and learning about my history and the generations of women before me, I have completed the work my ancestor started. I have made my quilts from 150-year-old handsewn quilting patches inherited by my great, great, great grandmother Ruth J. Thompson (nee Wallace), 1848-1931. Exploring my identity in a new world, beyond the practical nature of women's roles in the past, now replaced by creativity and self-expression.

Artist Statement

Butterflies are a symbol of rebirth and transformation, and something that I hold close to my heart as my grandmother admires them with me. This self-portrait was inspired by my family, who have always lifted me up. The black and white tones represent a past that I may not remember, but vibrant colours being that young girl that has led me to who I am today. The third view perspective encultures the fact that my family knows me better than I do.

Artist Statement

The scars of Australia's colonial history of systemic murder and assimilation run deep in millions of Australians today. *Caught* is an expression of lost Aboriginal culture, the piece only a superficial façade of a traditional fish-trap, lacking the skills and knowledge needed to be functional. The human scale reflects the experiences of many today, gripped with the sense of being an 'imposter' felt through cultural loss. My own personal history as a person with Kamilaroi Aboriginal heritage that was hidden within generations of my family during the time of the Stolen Generation is a major influence on my art.




Sherisse Vilar

Artist Statement

My collection of drawings encapsulates feminist cultural connections and female empowerment. The work, inspired by Filipino women, demonstrate spiritual guidance to raise a family in a male-dominated, post-colonial society. The work conveys a generational transition and experiences regarding the central roles of women in society. The 'Walis' (broom) in the centre portrays the traditional roles of women that are tied to maternal duties and housekeeping. Symbolic, cultural motives and advancement of women's roles create a cultural dichotomy, detaching from customary practices.

Pieces of Me 2023 synthetic polymer on paper, acrylic

Artist Statement

Pieces of Me is a collection of pixelated artworks that explore the distinct perspective of a wheelchair-bound person. Each painting represents a part of my disability, Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA), as a 'piece' of my experience being human. SMA is a genetic condition that causes progressive muscle weakness and its' symbolic colour is purple. Each piece of the artwork includes an experience or memory from my childhood that made me the person I am today.



My current favourite artist is Gerwyn Davies. I love his use of costuming and photography, the way that his work is quite simple yet captivating.




