FOSTERING 21ST CENTURY SKILLS THROUGH ARTS EDUCATION

In an era characterised by rapid advancements in technology and dynamic shifts in the global landscape, the skills essential for post-school success have shifted dramatically. The Arts, frequently underestimated in their capacity for transformation, emerge as an influencer in nurturing a holistic skill set that equips individuals to excel in the world, no matter which career path they choose. Twenty first century, or soft skills, which overlap and interact in all Arts subjects, are derived from current education, industry and community expectations.

Critical thinking and problem solving: Engaging in arts subjects, Drama, Dance, Media, Music and Visual Art, has been correlated with the cultivation of advanced cognitive skills such as critical thinking and problem-solving. When students develop works in an artistic process, they're required to solve problems through questions that have more than one possible resolution. Looking and talking about art with others teach students critical and creative thinking; communication skills and visual literacy. Cognitive operations also grow in a relatively short time specially observing, speculating and reasoning on the basis of evidence (Eggemeyer, 2006). Responding, appraisal, analysis, synthesis and evaluation assessment skills in arts curriculum subjects significantly enhance critical thinking and problem-solving skills, particularly when students are required to analyse others or devise their own, creative intent and viewpoint. Assessment tasks in senior syllabus subjects, are focussed on the creative process, with critical thinking skills essential

Communication and collaboration: All disciplines within the Arts furnish a distinct platform for enriching communication skills, with assessment in these disciplines emphasising collaboration. Collaborative artistic creation nurtures active listening, comprehension of verbal and non-verbal cues, and the ability to work in tandem. Collaborative undertakings necessitate empathy, a respect for diverse viewpoints, and negotiation skills - all of which are indispensable attributes in society and are preferred by employers. These experiences surpass individualism, fostering a sense of solidarity while nurturing interpersonal bonds (Brouilette, 2010). Any day of the week you can walk into the dance or drama studio at your school to see collaboration and communication at work, even more so with arts based extra-curricular programs.

Personal and social aptitudes: The Arts play an essential role in cultivating adaptable, resilient, and culturally astute individuals. Through creative expression, students cultivate mindfulness, self-

awareness, and open-mindedness. The Arts instil values of ethical discernment, citizenship, and leadership, fostering conscientious global citizens adept at bridging divides and discovering commonalities. In The Arts and Australian Education: Realising Potential, studies found increases in tolerance and an increase in social perspective-taking for students who saw live theatre performances. Seeing live theatre appears to make students more understanding of and accepting of different people (Ewing, 2010).

Creative thinking: Nurturing creativity is of paramount importance in an era where innovation propels advancement. Arts education fosters curiosity, imagination, and the aptitude to formulate and implement inventive concepts. This creative aptitude is indispensable for addressing intricate challenges. In the words of Pink (2006), The future belongs to a very different kind of person with a very different kind of mind - creators and empathisers, pattern recognisers, and meaning makers.

In a world demanding adaptability, interdisciplinary thinking, and cultural fluency, the arts serve as an invaluable catalyst for preparing young minds. As underscored by Winner, Goldstein, and Lancrin, the arts provide a realm free from definite answers, enabling exploration, experimentation, and introspection. The evolving skill landscape requires dynamic curricula, and arts subjects stand poised (and always have) to deliver active, experiential learning.

Arts education occupies a distinctive position in cultivating these proficiencies. While conventional academic subjects often rely on didactic instruction and passive learning methods, such as rote memorisation, arts education encourages and invites students to be active participants in their learning journey (Gullatt, 2007).

The Education program at HOTA is specifically designed to support the curriculum delivered in our classrooms, with succinct curriculum links, cross-curriculum priorities and general capabilities outlined for each performance, workshop, professional development or event. Developed by educators, this program aims to complement your teaching efforts and enrich the 21st-century skills of your students. While we recognise that not all students engaging with arts education will pursue artistic careers, the skills they acquire – critical thinking, problem-solving, creativity, communication, personal development, and social skills – are invaluable assets for success in any field.







THE VALUE OF THE ARTS IN REAL LIFE

Education is a dynamic process that extends far beyond the confines of traditional classrooms. Even by delivering a robust school-based program, experiential learning through exposure to art galleries and live performances is a transformative educational tool for teachers and is critical to quality teaching and learning.

Through their ability to engage a range of senses and expose audiences to works that transcend historical eras, cultures, geographies and social perspectives, arts institutions, such as HOTA profoundly enrich holistic educational approaches. In this way, an education partnership between schools and arts institutions represent the ultimate goal of education; making students active and lifelong participants in the resources of their communities. (Vallance, 2007; Bassam, N., 2012)

Artworks and performance pieces often embody a rich layering of multiple concepts, themes and literacies. In their resolve to communicate, explore and extend real and imagined worlds, viewers are naturally invited to integrate a range of understandings through this experience. From this, we can appreciate that experiencing the arts in first hand contexts opens students up to new ways of seeing, experiencing, and connecting to themselves, others, and the broader world. (NAEA, 2020) In considering this rich and multilayered input, students are affected in ways that cause them meaningful learning by using their minds, senses and bodies to respond to and interpret the themes and literacies presented to them. (Bassam N., 2012)

In the framework of drama for example, we can appreciate the way a live experience allows us to engage with the immediacy and performance energy of the cast, to witness the transformation of character, the quality of language, and the effect and meaning of complex visual imagery' (QCAA, 2019). When compared to experiencing performance through

recorded media, research suggests that though watching movies is an extremely common school practice, but it may produce little deep learning. (Greene, et. al., 2018)

In this way, visiting galleries and live performance 'provides ways of engaging those students who were otherwise difficult to engage; connect students to themselves, to each other as well as to the world; transform the learning environment itself, and importantly; challenge those students who were already successful. (Ewing, 2010)

Another fundamental benefit of arts institutions is their provision of Artist Educators or Teaching Artists to support education programs. "A teaching artist is a practicing professional artist with the complementary skills, curiosities and sensibilities of an educator, who can effectively engage a wide range of people in learning experiences in, through, and about the arts." (Booth, 2010, p. 2).

Artist Educators work alongside an institution's education team and when engaging school audiences, deliver learning that spans professional worlds, exposes students to real disciplinary practices, and builds the capacity of the educators they partner with (Wardrip, date unknown). HOTA is proud to provide Artist Educators to actively enrich the learning experiences of students and teachers across a range of programs and initiatives.

Visiting galleries and live performances serve not just to supplement to classroom education; they are integral to a holistic, well-rounded learning experience. Ultimately, arts institutions, such as HOTA, expand education objectives by connecting and stimulating students with to rich artworks in real life contexts, making learning a truly transformative and lifelong journey.


